

MEANT TO BE

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Some things really are meant to be and the story of how Bob and Jenn Boughner found their home is a perfect example of one of those serendipitous moments. Two years ago, just as the Boughners were preparing to build a new home on a lot they had purchased, friends introduced them to a couple who wanted to buy the very home the Boughners wanted to sell. As if that wasn't convenient enough, the prospective buyers were living in the exact home the Boughners had dreamed about building.

"It was amazing," Jenn Boughner says as she pulls out clippings from her "dream file." "The photographs I'd been tearing out of magazines looked exactly like the rooms in this house." Indeed, the old-world inspired, stone home the Boughners acquired is uncannily like the house Jenn had imagined. Jenn toured the house first. Then Bob, who was working for the NHL's Columbus Blue Jackets and was in Sweden for a week coaching at the time, did a walk-through when he returned home on Thanksgiving weekend 2010. 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"It didn't take me long to know this home was perfect for our family," Bob agrees. "It took a few days, but we worked out a deal to "swap" houses and here we are."

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Here we are, indeed. Although the home is grand, the sense that a real family lives here is the overriding impression. The scent of freshly baked muffins fills the air. Emma, 13, works on a school project at the granite island in the kitchen. Lola, 10, is busy completing a jig-saw puzzle on the dining room table, and Jenn shows us samples from her supremely tempting business venture, Dip Stix – pretzel sticks coated in a variety of delicious and creative toppings. Introduced publicly at a recent charity event, the Stix were so well received that Jenn, who had been making them just for family and friends, began getting orders from local businesses and from companies as far away as Toronto. 

Situated on the water, the three-storey, 12,000 sq. ft. home gives the impression it has been there forever. Its classic façade, graceful gothicarched windows, stained glass, wood-burning fireplaces and hand-cut, natural-stone walls give it a sense of grandeur and permanence that is rarely seen in new homes.

The entryway leads into an expansive living room where a soaring, limestone mantel dominates a space framed by banks of floor-to-ceiling windows. The room is flooded with natural light and the view onto a sunken pool, a sandy beach and Lake St. Clair is beyond magnificent. A wrought-iron railing festooned with white lights leads to the grand entry and sunken courtyard off the basement family room.







The downstairs family room started life as Bob's man cave but soon became a hang-out for the Boughner children, particularly Brady, 16 and Molly, 15 who regularly use it to host parties for their friends. It features a wood-burning fireplace and a wet bar with a granite island and leather bar stools. One corner, featuring Bob's retired hockey jerseys and other memorabilia, is a salute to his action-packed career in the NHL. On the other side of the bar, a hall, again with a selection of jerseys representing the many teams Boughner played for, leads to an indoor lap pool. Tucked behind the floor-to-ceiling fireplace is an exercise area, change room and sauna. Continued on page 26



Cathedral-style arches are a large part of the home's charm. The long hallway, which separates the living room and kitchen from the foyer and dining room, is constructed with a series of arches set off by recessed, wooden display areas, and stone columns. The exterior and interior stone is identical, marrying the outdoor grandeur with interior architectural detailing.

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

Indeed, the architectural details throughout are incredible. From the coffered ceilings, to the domed stained glass window above the foyer, to the herringbone parquet wood floor in the dining room, there is a sense of stepping back to a time when craftsmanship was paramount.

It's clear that for Bob, who is well-known in the community an owner, President and Head Coach of the Windsor Spitfires, as well as for his philanthropy, family life is a true joy. "I grew up on the east side," he says. "My parents still live there. Family is everything."

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"We used to walk around this neighbourhood and we always noticed this house," Jenn says. "And now, when I set the table in the dining room for a family gathering, I have a sense of déjà vu. I love looking inside when the lights are on and seeing everyone gathered around the table. It feels like it was meant to be."
